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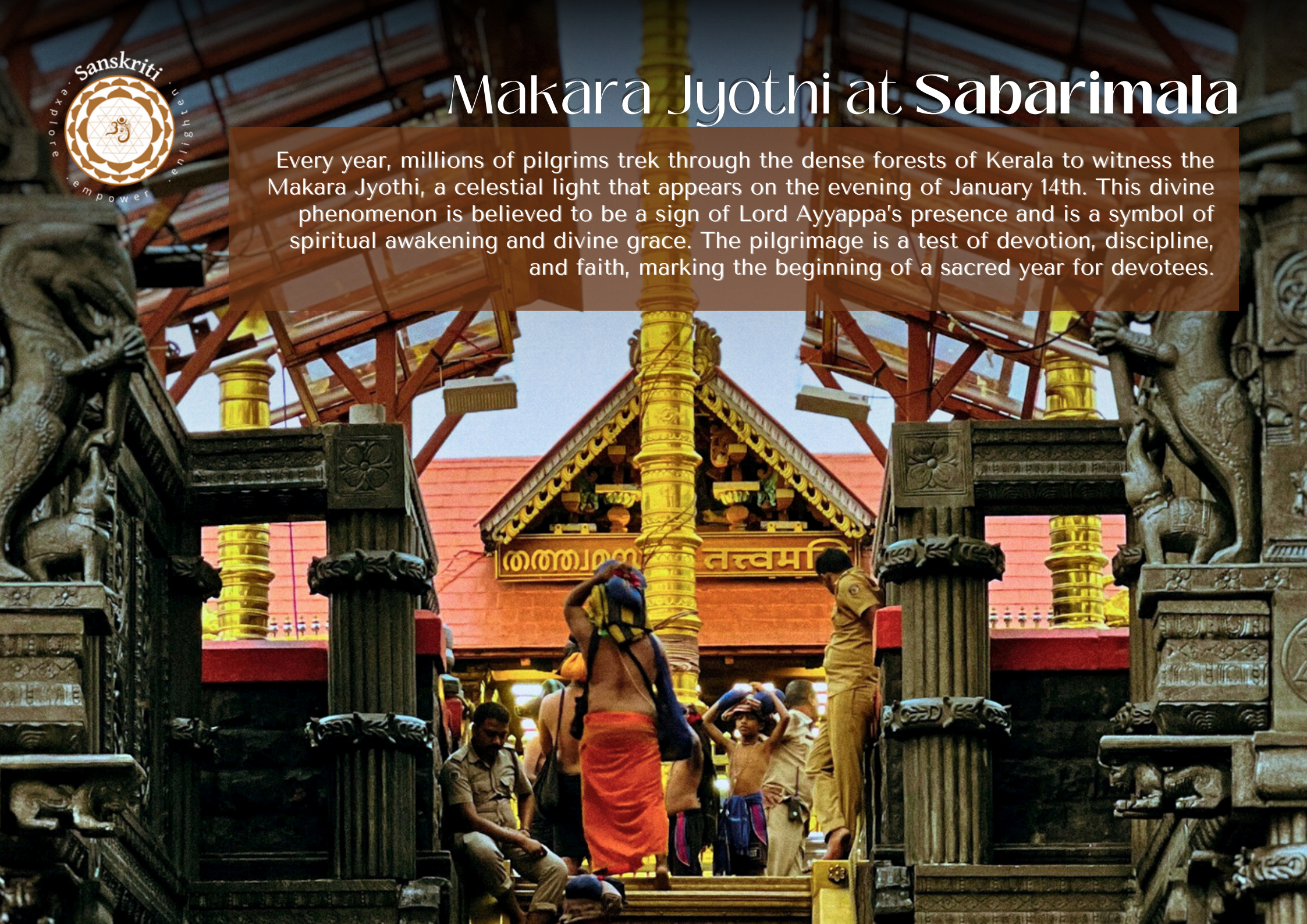


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Makara Jyothi at Sabarimala

Vaishno Devi During Navratri

The Vaishno Devi shrine in Jammu draws over 10 million visitors annually, especially during the nine days of Navratri in March. The temple is situated at an altitude of 5,300 feet, and the 13 km trek to the cave shrine is considered a spiritual journey where devotees seek the blessings of Goddess Durga in her three forms—Maha Kali, Maha Lakshmi, and Maha Saraswati.

Rama Navami at Rameswaram

Rameswaram is linked to the epic Ramayana, where Lord Rama worshipped Lord Shiva to seek divine blessings before embarking on his battle against Ravana. The temple here is known for its sacred waters, and the Ramanathaswamy Temple has one of the longest corridors in India, offering a peaceful and spiritual atmosphere for pilgrims. Rama Navami in April marks the birth of Lord Rama, and special prayers and rituals are held throughout the day.

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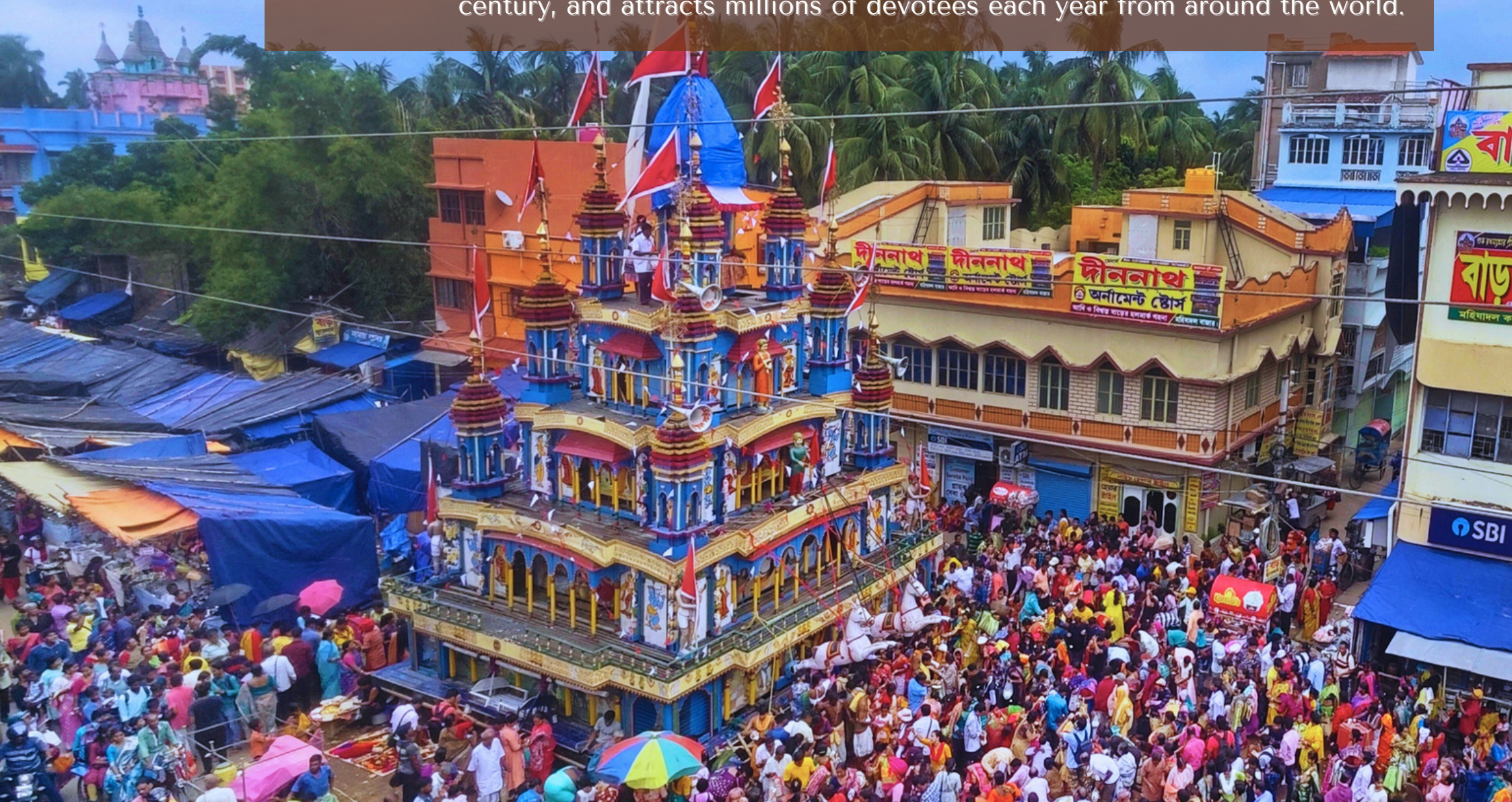

Amarnath Yatra

The Amarnath Yatra, held in July, leads pilgrims to the sacred Amarnath Cave in Jammu and Kashmir, where the naturally occurring ice Lingam of Lord Shiva is worshipped. The yatra involves a rigorous trek of 14-16 km, with pilgrims braving harsh weather conditions and difficult terrain. The shrine is believed to be where Lord Shiva revealed the secret of immortality to Goddess Parvati.





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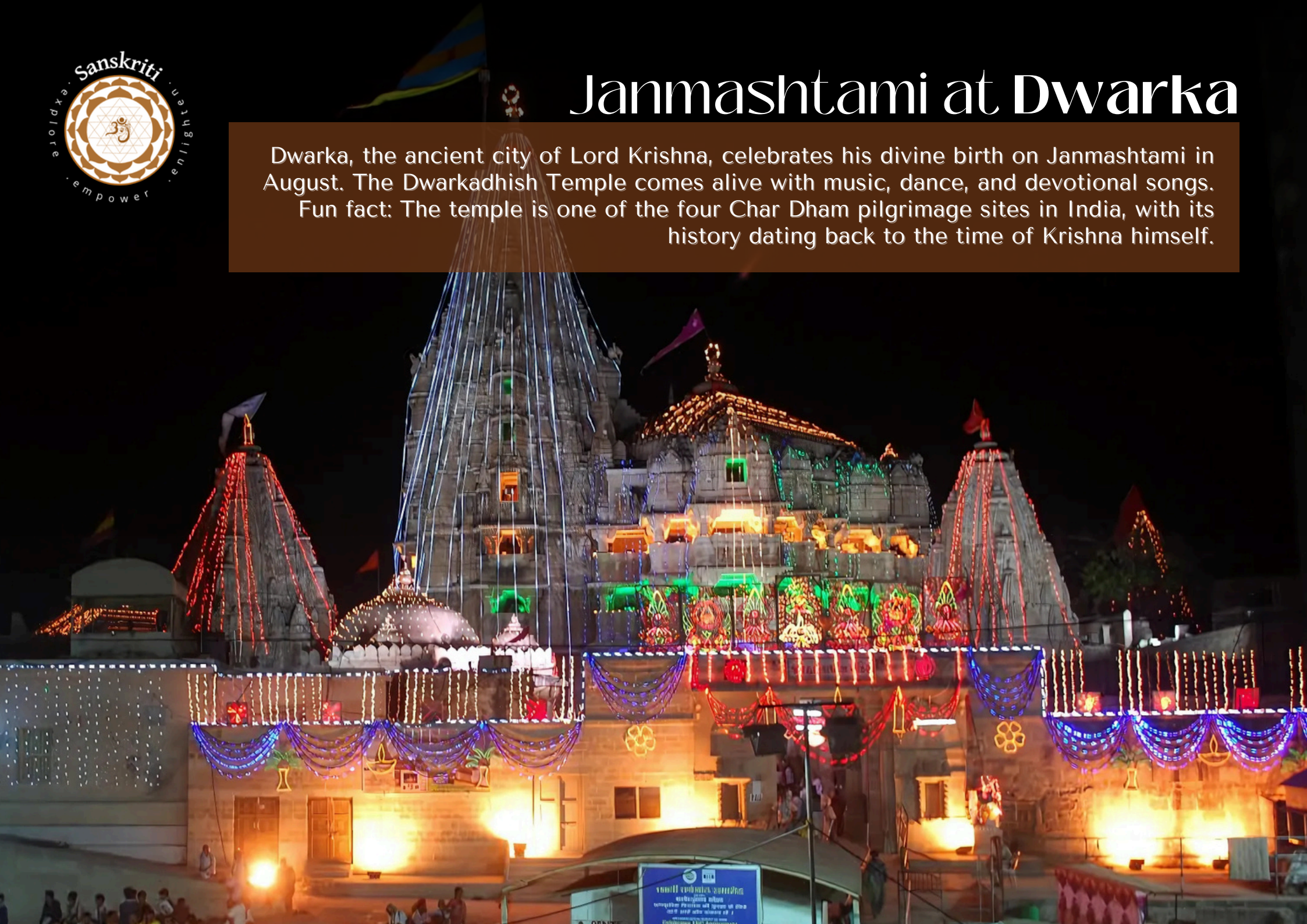

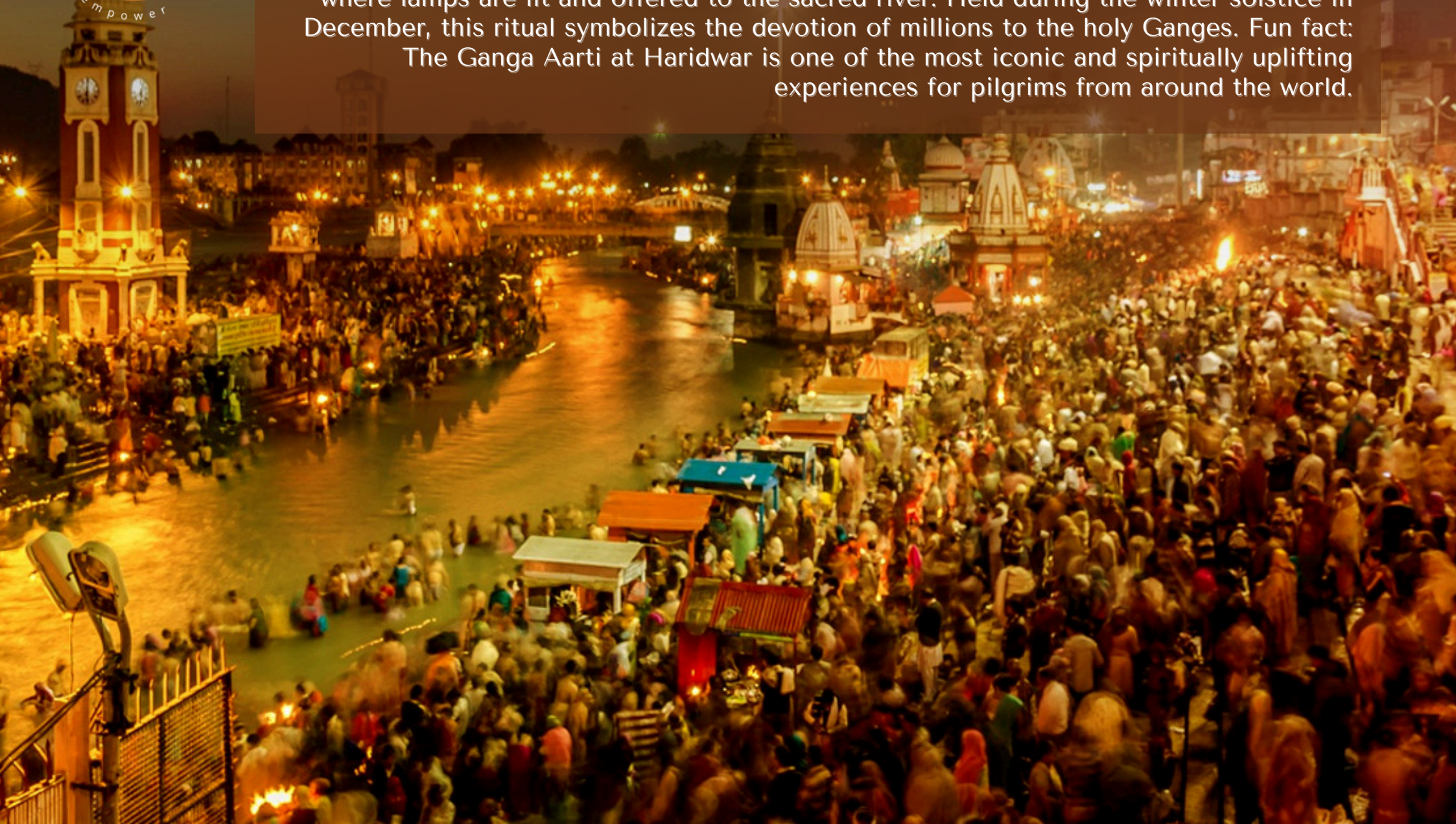
